
Door Entry System and Alertus (Panic Button) Upgrades

DISTRICT SAFETY AND SECURITY INITIATIVES

PA System Upgrades

Walt Whitman Security Booth (Grant Funded)

 Assemblyman Stern and former Senator Gaughran secured grant funding for a high-tech security booth at Whitman's main driveway entrance (awaiting release of funding)

Law Enforcement Collaboration

- 2nd Precinct School Resource Officer and Suffolk County Police Department Homeland Security Section provided workshops to District Leadership and Staff
- They are part of the District's Joint Operations and Emergency Services Task Force,
 which is actively planning an emergency response exercise
- School Resource Officer is member of the District Safety Committee and actively participates in school emergency drills

ARMED SECURITY PERSONNEL

Unfortunately, incidents of school tragedies across the nation continue to occur.

After careful consideration and an extensive process, the district decided to add an additional tier of security and recently contracted for armed guards.

The intent is for this to serve as a deterrent and to be able to reduce response time, which in turn can save lives, in the event of an Active Shooter type emergency.




A Review of 2022-2023 Budgeted Revenue Approximations

• Other Revenues: 5 %






Applied fund balance and reserves: 3 %

FOUNDATION AID

 Foundation Aid was created in 2007 and takes school district wealth and student need into account to create an equitable distribution of state funding to schools.

 It is the most substantial aid category supporting public schools.

 There is a commitment from the State legislature to fully fund the district's Foundation Aid.


EXPENSE BASED AID

 Expense based aid is received based on our prior year expenditures.

 This is based on categories such as Transportation, BOCES, Building Aid, Instructional Materials Aid.

2023/24: EXECUTIVE STATE AID PROPOSAL

- Foundation Aid: \$ 51,305,970
- Expense Based Aid: \$ 19,153,190
- UPK Aid: \$ 1,794,215
 - Total Proposed Aid: \$ 72,253,375



EXPECTED 2023/24 COSTS

- Pension system rates:
 - a. ERS 13.10% (increase of 1.50%)
 - b. TRS Estimated to be close to current rate of 10.29%.

<u>Note</u>: Expenditures are expected to increase as they are a function of salaries.

- Healthcare costs challenge: schools have to project the second half of the school year. January of 2023 we received an increase of approximately 15%.
- Utility costs are increasing: we are closely monitoring a potential increase of approximately 20%

- Continuous strive for excellence
- Provide learning opportunities and meet the academic as well as social-emotional needs of all students
- Close achievement gaps
- Continuity and expansion of programs
- Strengthen community partnerships
- Fiscal sustainability including reducing reserve reliance as State Aid increases
- Enhancement of safety measures and the upkeep of facilities & grounds
